* * FOREWORD * *

This little volume is a study of a minute unit of a great democracy. Unfortunately there exists no pictoral record of the very early Norwegian settlers of Coon Valley. Perhaps some day some one with imagination and artistic ability will reconstruct the life of these earliest pioneers graphically.

In the days of long ago (1850) the settlers went into the woods, cut down trees and shaped the logs into a house. A store, a church, a school and a blacksmithship were built with logs. Soon a dam was built on Coon Creek which furnished the water power for a stone grit mill which ground and sifted the grains into flour and feed.

To provide the necessities of life was a serious and severe struggle. The soil was fertile, but the land had to be cleared by grubbing. For a time, stream and forest furnished an abundance of tish and game. The Norwegians did not take so well to having only skins and pelts for clothes and bedding, so they raised sheep, sheared them, and carded, spun and wove the wool into cloth for clothes, bedding, etc. Perhaps local vegetation furnished the dyes used. Little cotton was used because it was so expensive.

They had a mighty source of power in the form of oxen. These were guided without reins by using four words: giddap, whoa, gee, and haw. An oxen trip to La Crosse (18
miles) over the primitive road was an event of three or four days. The principle vehicle was
a home-made affair called a "kubberull." The wheels of this were four inch sections of the
largest log available. The more prosperous settler had iron tires on the wheels. The bearings of the wheels and axle were, of course, of wood. Even with the slowly moving oxen and
wheels lubricated with tallow or bear grease there was powerful squeaking.

The furniture was all made at home. To conserve space during the day time, a fullsized lower bed could be pushed under a higher bed. The mattresses were straw ticks. Deer skin thongs and later ropes woven on the bed frame supported the ticks. Each log house had several benches, a table, a cabinet and one or more "kubbestols." The latter was hewn out of a section of a log to give a seat and also back and arm rests. The privilege of sitting in these went to the senior members of the family. Other home industries consisted of making tallow candles (the only source of artiificial light for many years), moccasins, maple sirup, soap (from wood ashes and animal fat)
and the curing of meat. By about 1870 they had iron stoves and stove pipes. We can imagine that the blacksmith was an important man in those days. The store supplied salt, sugar,
tobacco, coffee, tea, gun powder, shot, essential hardware, medicines and other prime needs.
These supplies were hauled by oxen from La Crosse.

Dances were held in the houses because the log barns did not have floors. Waltzes square dances, particularly the "spring" dance were popular. All guests could not take part in the "halling" because that required the ability to kick to the ceiling (about 7 feet).

There was not much law business in Goon Valley, and such as there was largely consisted in land title transactions at the county seat. Although Gund's brewery furnished refreshments for dances and weddings there were no brawls. This community of God-fearing people has been singularily free from murders, stabbings and scandals. Once there was a scare in Goon Valley because Jesse James had stayed over night at Prairie House, a tavern on the La Crosse road. The host slep well that night because Jesse did not identify himself until the next morning. The local justice of the peace had little official business. The pastor and teacher were respected as learned men. There was no family whose social standing towered over that of another. It was, and I believe still is, a small democratic unit like so many others from which grew the great United States.

The authors have done a commendable service to the present and future generations and to future historians in compiling this book, and it is most sincerely wished and hoped that it will be a most welcome addition to every home library in Coon Valley. July 25, 1942.





JOSEPH FENCL

Not only as the village blacksmith, but as one of Coon Valley's most loved and respected citizens, "Joe" Fencl has lived in Coon Valley since he came to America in 1892. He came over on the "Kaiser Wilhelm" from Vienna. Joe' Fencl was born near Pilsea, Czechoslavakia, November 12, 1869, and he went to Vienna at the age of 13 to learn his trade, as an apprentice blacksmith working in a factory for three years. "Then I got my diploma", 'Joe' chuckles as he recalls those days in Vienna in the gay '90's. "There wasn't any depression there THEN," he recalls. His brother Frank came over with him.

'Joe' Fencl worked at John Stuempges' blacksmith shop (see page 8) for fifteen years after he came to Coon Valley. Then he rented a shop for

four years before he bought his own blacksmith shop. He has been the village blacksmith for 50 years. But that isn't all. He's been fire-chief for 25 years, and janitor of the Catholic church for 25 years. There are very few Catholic families living in this Norwegian Lutheran community, "'Guess I was janitor 'cause there wasn't any one else to be it," 'Joe modestly says. 'Joe' has been the drummer in the Coon Valley band for many years, and also served the village board.

Joseph Fencl was married to Mary Sedevia. St. Joseph Ridge, in 1906 the same year he bought his blacksmith shop from Albert Thrune. They had four children, two of whom are living—Agnes and Frank.







The photo on the right was taken of Lars K. Brve in his home, in the year 1895. He built his house in 1857. The room shown in this picture was an addition built later, in 1868, and it still remains on the northwest corner of the house where Adolph C. Brye now lives. Built of logs, the original house built by Lars K. Brye measured 26 feet by 20 feet. Below is a picture of Mr. and Mrs. Lars K. Brye. Mr. Brye emigrated from Norway to America in 1849, and he died in 1915.





4th OF JULY . . 1906





A colorful parade, races, fire-crackers, and the reading of the Declaration of Independence by Emily Stromstad were some of the high-lights of the big celebration in Coon Valley on July 4, 1906. It was that day the "State Ladies" marched in the parade, each one dressed in white, carrying a banner with the name of the state she represented. (As you know, there were only 45 states at that time, for Oklahoma, Arizona, and New Mexico hadn't joined the Union).

This was the day of the 'fat-men's race' — when Irishman McPheters won, although he came in last, because he was the first to touch the rope! It was the day of the dusty, noisy horse race right up Main Street, when Sempke's horse won the race with a dead gallop. Laura Strangstalien won the 'ladies' ball throwing contest! People thronged to the village from miles away, and in the evening there were fireworks.

The top picture shows part of the parade. John Moilien, Civil War veteran, is carrying the flag. The other picture (above) shows the "State Ladies" on parade.





. . . . "I began my long journey to Coon Valley, where a large fest was to be held. Saturday, the 7th, I reached La Crosse, where I met many old friends. J. H. Koefod, schoolteacher and book-seller, Coon Valley, had come to La Crosse to meet me. At about 4 o'clock we began our journey to Coon Valley. We went rhough Mormon Coulee, over the ridge, and reached the village by 8 p.m. I stayed with him at his home. "50 yr fest" was the next day. Sunday the 8th. From all directions came the horse drawn vehicles. It was a beautiful day in every respect."






The picture on the left shows the church at the time of a Sangerfest in 1909. The above picture shows the same occasion. Notice the two flags—American above Norwegian.

ST. MARY'S CHURCH





The picture above is of Father Theo. Fraling, taken in 1942. Father Fraling was the architect and constructor of the Catholic church in Coon Valley, and pastor there from 1910 until 1923. The congregation was organized in the fall of 1909 and there were about 20 families in it then. Joseph Fencl and Martin Thiele were elected trustees. The cornerstone was laid and blessed by Father Fraling on April 7, 1910. A sanctuary was added to the church by him in 1918. (The above picture was taken before the sanctuary was added). The picture on the left, (below), shows Father Fraling's Beagle hound sitting in his famous Sears car. Father Pinion is the present pastor of this church.



THE VILLAGE DOCTORS

DR. HERMANN J. A. KERSIECK practiced medicine in Ozaukee, Vernon and Grant counties for forty nine years. He was born in Blankenhagen, Germany, and was educated in the Friedrich Wilhelm University of Berlin, University of Leipzig, and the University of Munich. He received his Doctor's degree at the University of Freiburg in 1889. He was married to Marie Scheidet of Freiburg, Germany, and came to the United States in October, 1892. Dr. Kersieck died at the age of 77 years, in 1941.

He is a member of the staff of the La Crosse hospital and served as president of the staff for three years. He has been the village doctor in Coon Valley since 1915.

THE COON VALLEY CHURCH ORCHESTRA - -

This orchestra was organized in 1914, and at that time it consisted of four pieces: O. Moilien, violin, P. Stromstad, flute, J. Stromstad, cornet, Laura Neprud Veum, piano. The personnel of the orchestra grew, and changed, rapidly. In 1915, Rossing Glimmie, trombone, in 1916, Hans Neprud, cello, 1919, William Storandt, trombone (to replace Mr. Glimmie who moved from the village in 1917). In 1920, Professor H. H. Bye, La Crosse, joined the group as director, his son, Arthur, as clarinetist, and Lawrence Sandsmark, drummer.

By 1922 Mr. Bye had developed a concert program. The orchestra then consisted of nine pieces two violins, clarinet, cornet, trombone, cello, string bass, piano, and drums. Regular rehearsals were held and the first concert of the Coon Valley Church Orchestra was on February 21, 1922. It was a great success and a repetition of the program was given in Chaseburg the following evening.

Lillian Neprud Evans assisted the orchestra at concerts and soon after became the regular pianist when Mrs. Veum moved from Coon Valley. She continued until 1938, when ill health forced her to discontinue as full-time pianist. Others who have been in the orchestra are as follows: A. Brye, Joseph Hylland, Selmer Lee, Hjalmer Halvorson, (Westby), Wayne Bergum, (Westby), Mrs. I. N. Knutson, Mrs. Helen Neprud Reitman (Red Wing, Minnesota), and Edith Eielson.

Joseph Linrud joined the orchestra in 1924, Rev. H. O. Bach, in 1929, also Chester Hegge, (Westby) and John Ophus. Of the original group, only three members remain, they are the violinist, cornetist, and the bass violinist. Oscar Moilien has been member-director and librarian since the beginning of the organization.



Since it began, the Coon Valley Church orchestra has appeared in almost every church in the Vernon circuit, and it has made more than 400 public appearances. Only classical and semi-classical music is played, and the present repertoire consists of about 225 standard orchestrations.





This is perhaps the first house that was built in Coon Valley, as it looks today 89 years old. It was built in 1853 by NELS SKOMSRUD, and over its threshold the first bride in Coon Valley was carried in that year, for Skomsrud's marriage to ELLENE MORTENS-DATTER in 1853 by a circuit pastor was the first in Coon Valley. Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Thrune lived in the house from 1890 until 1905. The picture below shows the house as it looked when purchased by Charlie Thrune in 1890 a long, two-room house. Before 1890 there had been a 'lean-to' on one side. The same old peg stairway that was built in 1853 still remains. When the present Thrune home was built 38 years ago the frame part of the old house was torn down, and it remains on the Thrune property today . . . a lovely, historic old one-room cabin. This summer it is being used as a tourist cabin.



CIVILIAN CONSERVATION CORPS CAMP IN COON VALLEY

The Soil Erosion Service, United States Department of the Interior, established Project No. 1 at Coon Valley Wisconsin, in the fall of 1933. Cooperative agreements were signed with farmers living within the boundaries of the Coon Creek watershed to set up demonstrations in controlling soil erosion, as the first of its kind anywhere. The work connected with these practices was carried out by the farmers and the C. W. A. and P. W. A. labor prior to the establishment of Civilian Conservation Corps camp company 1697-CCC. It was started in May, 1934, coming from Long Lake, Wisconsin, and the men lived in tents until October, 1934, when the camp buildings were ready. The site was located on the A. C. Brye farm just across the bridge, west from the village of Coon Valley.

This camp was occupied from 1934 until July, 1937, when the buildings were dismantled. During these three years several hundred boys from far and near were stationed at the camp, and Coon Valley became a well known spot on the map, as many visitors interested in the work being done, came from all parts of the United States and some from foreign countries.



The camp staff and Soil Erosion staff worked together on more than 400 of the 750 farms in the watershed. The following are a few of the men connected with the service: HEBERLIEN, QUSTGAARD, SCHIVEERS, HALL, ROBBINS, COHEE, CALKINS, REBER, FRY, DENSMORE, WALTERS, LAIDLOW, SMITH, KELIHER, KIMBALL, ALLEN, BALL, DYER, LEITH, DUPUIS, OSTHOFF, SNEIDER, and many others who received part of their training here were later transferred to other projects as the program expanded.

Some of the men from Coon Valley territory who were connected with this project were, NELS NORDSTROM, CY THOMPSON, HENRY STAKSTON, MERVIN HENLEY, SAM STROMSTAD, CHARLES THRUNE, IRVIN THRUNE, HOWARD ANDERSON, EINAR ANDERSON, ART KUESTER, PALMER OLSON, ED KOKKEBY, ALF OLSTAD, GRANT KARLSTAD, SYLVESTER KING, OSCAR MIDTLIEN, T. MOILIEN, HJALMER MATHISON, JOHN KRAABEL, ELMER NELSON, HENRY ELSON, CLAYTON VEUM, ARCHIE PAULSON, ED KERSKA, FRANK KOENEN, J. FRANSWORTH, ANTON NORDSTROM, GLEN NORDSTROM, JULIAN SUND, HENRY HOLD, C. GLENN, ROY STAFLSIEN, WOODROW THOMPSON, JOHN JACOBSON, HAROLD PETERSON, and others. The camp constructed soil saving devices such as crop inlets, diversion dikes, sod hump water, deflecting dams and tree planting on the steep denuded hillsides, also planting for stream bank and wild life protection.

Many will remember the nursery across from the church on the Adolph Lee Farm as a source for seedlings and trees to carry on this work, also the stream gauging station by the mill and the carrier in which the checkers rode across the stream to get his samples of the water, in testing for silt load or soil being carried to the Mississippi. In later years the service had its name changed to Soil Conservation Service, United States Department of Agriculture.

Some of the army personnel connected with the camp were: Lt. Dunwoody, Lt. Hofto, Lt. Seigel, Lt. Heidorn, Lt. Vedner, Captain Branch.

HEALING THE WOUNDS THAT MAN HAS MADE

By E. L. VINTON-Farm Forester, Vernon County Soil Conservation District

The history of agriculture in the Coon Valley community is, in general, similar to that of Wisconsin and all other states. The unique feature is that the Coon Valley community was the first to make a joint attempt to do something about it.

As in other parts of the United States, intensive cultivation and over-grazing cut through the protective cover of sod which nature had layed over prairie soils and broke up the accumulation of leaf mould and litter beneath the trees. This exposed the soil to the direct effect of rains, and erosion was the inevitable result.

In 1934, the Soil Erosion Service recognized the Coon Valley area as one of the first to be used for demonstrational and experimental purposes. Because of the interest and cooperation of the people in this area, the demonstrational work progressed rapidly and widely. Today all states have an interest in soil conserving practices, 42 states have soil conservation district laws, and the techniques developed in Coon Valley are used in all states in which there is comparable topography, soil types, and agricultural practices.

Some views that explain and show some of the work done in the Coon Valley project are presented on the following pages.





"FELLOWMAN" was his nick-name, but his real name was Amund Pederson Vekleenget. He came to Timber Coulee in the early '70s and worked at the Baglien Farm. "Fellowman" came from North Dakota where he had two sisters who wanted to look after him. Three times he was sent to North Dakota to them but each time he walked back to Timber Coulee. He loved the coulee . . . he liked the prosperous, green valleys and the kind people living there. The picture on the left shows "Fellowman" feeding the goats on the Baglien farm. His queer manners and habits were due to a sun-stroke but he was a strong, loyal, hard-working man, and he had great love for nature and animals.



IN OIUMSDALEN



Like a tiny Norwegian village—in a colorful setting of hills and a rich, green valley—is the Old Oium Mill. The picture above was taken before 1900. The house on the extreme left was used then as the post-office and general store, the small building next to it was Iver Oium's store, and the house in the back (center) of the picture was the home of Iver Oium. His son, Iver Jr., lived in the building next to the mill. The picture on the right (below) shows the mill in about 1915, the Ole Dahlen farm in the distance.

The mill—which has rounded out more than a half century of service—was built by Iver Oium in 1891. An earlier mill on the same site was built by Mr. Oium in 1855, but was torn down later. At the busiest times the mill was going constantly day on night. Flour was ground for the people of the community, there was no commercial selling of it. As pay for grinding their flour, the miller took a toil—as for 8 pecks ground he would keep one peck as his fee for grinding. The present proprietor is Martinius Oium, son of Iver Oium who has worked in the mill since it was built.







ESOFEA · · · in 1870 · · ·




On the extreme left in this picture is the old home of Nels and Randi Ellingsrud, Nels is standing by the corner of the house, Randi Ellingsrud and Agnethe Rentz in the garden. Across the road (the building numbered I) is the store operated at that time by A. K. Strand. The building next to the store (numbered 2) was then occupied by Michael and Agnethe Rentz, later moved to the hill near the schoolhouse. On the lower right side of the picture is the tannery operated by Rentz Brothers, and the Rentz's first barn. In the upper right side of the picture part of the old school house may be seen. When Ella Hunter taught at the Esofea School in about 1880, the district furnished no clock for the school and the teacher had no time-piece of her own. So Mrs. Agnethe Rentz, whose home was on the hill next to the school house, placed a white cloth in the window of her home when it was 9 o'clock, 10:30, 10:45, etc., so the teacher would know when to call recess, noon-hour and other school periods.




THE "HANNAH PARR"

MICHAEL RENTZ was born in Gausdal, Norway in 1846, and he came to America in 1868 on the "Hannah Parr"; (shown on the right). The journey across the stormy Atlantic in this ship took 22 weeks. Below are excerpts literally translated from an account of the journey written by Michael Rentz in Norwegian.

"On Easter Morning, the twelfth day of April, 1868, at four o'clock, anchor was raised, the sails were hoisted in "Kristiania Havn", and with a lusty "hurrah" the weather-beaten ship, "Hannah Parr', glided through the beautiful fjord. We had an uneventful voyage until the 28th day of April, when we were in the middle of the Atlantic ocean and we ran into a terrific hurricane which lasted over twenty-four hours. That night the foremast broke with a splintering crash, as well as part of the mainmast, and the rudder was damaged to the extent that it barely hung, and it swayed back and forth with the roll of the ship. We were then entirely at the mercy of the sea. When the storm subsided the next day we could peek out through the latch door and see a terrifying scene. Everything which could be loosed had disappeared overboard, and the sails still remaining on the yard-arms were mere shreds. Everything was so damaged that the ship had to follow the wind.



Just after we left Ireland, the discovery was made that unwelcome guests had come aboard, and were very annoying and multiplied so rapidly that there must have been millions aboard.



Many of these 'guests' (gray-backs) came out alive with us into the States. We had as a whole good weather, but taking everything into consideration he voyage was hard and uncomfortable.

After about five weeks sailing we finally reached 'Grafs Isle'—a quarentine station where we remained for several days. There a tragedy occured when one of our passengers drowned. We finally got through the quarentine and came to Quebec, where the ship anchored and we met with un-looked-for trouble. There had been recently passed a law that no one could land unless he had means to go to the States. Further trouble for the Captain as he had furnished many passengers with provisions ever since the stay in Ireland. Many took advantage of his free provisions and free ride. Days went by and no one was permitted to land. Finally a letter was smuggled ashore to the consul and eventually we all set ashore in pouring rain. The Captain accompanied us to Chicago, then the 'flock' separated. Several of us went then to Decorah, Iowa. The journey had taken us 22 weeks'.

The parent of OLIANA DAFFINRUD came to America at the same time as Mr. Rentz, on the "Hannah Parr".








AS IT LOOKED IN 1879 Although these pictures were taken recently, they are of the old Ophus home as it looked many years ago the same old furnishings, arranged the way they were then, in the same one-room house. The house was built by Ole Ophus in 1879. It still remains as it was then as part of the house now occupied by Peter Ophus, which was added on to the original home later.

The clock on the shelf was made by the New Haven Clock Company and purchased in 1873. It is still keeping accurate time when wound. It is a one-day clock, with no springs, and it keeps going by means of weights.

The spinning wheel was brought from Norway, and it was old when brought from there in the spring of 1871. The cards and spools were also brought from Norway.

The old table was made in America by Ole Ophus in about 1871, and the chairs were purchased in La Crosse that same year. The old fashioned stairway (shown in one of the pictures above is the same one that was built originally. Notice the irons on the stove, the stove itself, the Norwegian Bible and Hymn-book brought from Norway, the cupboard, the old candle-holder, and the home-made wash bench and wood box. Hanging above the stove but not showing in the pictures are a home-made scissors and a candle-mold.

Peter Ophus still has the box filled with wooden shoe-pegs and the old wooden lasts used by his father in repairing shoes many years ago. They were brought from Ringebo, Gulbrandsdalen, Norway.
